

SPWT Citizenship

Citizenship Studies encourages students to be inspired, moved and changed by following a broad, coherent, satisfying and worthwhile course of study. This will enable students to gain the confidence and conviction to participate in decision making and play an active role as effective citizens in public life. It will enable students to engage with current issues and contribute to debates on challenges in society.

They will develop and apply understanding of key citizenship concepts such as justice, democracy, rights and responsibilities as well as learning how to use an enquiring and critical approach to distinguish between facts and opinions to make informed judgements.

This course will equip them with the skills they need to be an active citizen with a well-developed understanding of the systems and processes all around them.

Topic Areas:

Theme A	Living together in the UK: Students learn about community, migration, identity, respect, discrimination, rights and responsibilities in the UK.
Theme B	Democracy at work in the UK: Students learn about how elections work, the voting systems, how governments are formed, how laws are made and devolution.
Theme C	How the law works: Students explore the point of the law, the difference between civil and criminal law, types of courts, sentencing and how we can reduce crime.
Theme D	Power and influence: Students look at the different ways people can participate in a democracy, ways to increase voter turnout, trade unions, the media and their role in democracy.
Theme E	Taking Citizenship action: Students work in a team on an issue of their choosing (environment, human rights, democracy, and the law) and then deliver an event, meeting or campaign to raise awareness and help others.
