More useful information

Lockers

Lockers cost £10 to rent from Year 7 to Year 11. This cost is not refundable at any time, even at the end of your time in school. Lockers are not compulsory and many students choose to just carry their equipment and bag from lesson to lesson. If you would like a locker, you have to sign a locker protocol - this is an agreement that you will use the locker sensibly.

Lost Property

Lost property will be handed in at the Key Stage Three office which is open before school, during break and lunchtime and after school.

Lunch

We operate a cashless catering system. You will be give a lunch card which you can use to buy lunch and a snack at break time. Parents and carers have to use an app called 'SIMS Parents app' to top up your lunch money online. Those students who are eligible for a free school dinner will have their lunch card automatically topped up for them, but this doesn't include any snacks.

Parents' Forum

All parents are invited to join our Parents' Forum. We have a regular Parents' Tea and Coffee Mornings and Parent Drop-in sessions. Should you require further information kindly contact Mr Masud Rana, our parents' liaison.

Independent Learning and Student Planners

All students are given a planner at the start of each academic year; this must be kept up to date and well organised. Parents should check and sign the planner each week. Students will be set homework regularly, which must be recorded in planners. Included at the front of the planner is essential information about the school day and rules to which parents and students can refer if they are unsure of anything.

Planning your journey


Starting secondary school requires you to take on more responsibility; not just getting to lessons on time but also getting to school in the morning.

Secondary schools can often be further from your home, so it's good to plan how you will get to school on time.

Will you be dropped off by your parents? Will you get public transport? Or will you walk or cycle?

When walking to school, try to find at least one other neighbouring pupil who is going to the same school so that you have a travelling companion.

Do a practice trip to school particularly if you are catching a bus so it's not brand new to you on day one.







Planning your journey




When you start a new school, your morning routine and journey to school will change.

Top Tips: Preparing for the Day

You will have to prepare yourself for school each day.

These are some of the things you might need to do or think about the night before.

- Look at your timetable each night to see what books and equipment you may need.
- Make sure you have your pencil case with pens, pencils, ruler and rubber.
- Have you completed homework that needs to be handed in?
- Do you need your PE kit?
- Packed lunch?
- Bus Pass?
- Check your uniform and lanyard.
- Pack your bag the night before!

Equipment

Uniform

Uniform

All students are required to wear the full school uniform which can be purchased from Khalsa Schoolwear, 388-390 Bethnal Green Road, London E2 0AH. In addition to this, when the weather is cold, students should wear a warm, dark coloured (black or blue) coat. It is not appropriate to wear either brightly coloured outdoor clothing or hoodies. A dark coloured bag that can hold A4 sized books is needed.



As a new student, here are some tips which we hope will make school life easier and less daunting for you.


Starting at a new school is an exciting adventure but it can also be quite scary. Remember that you are not alone and that your classmates may be feeling the same as you.

Learning to Use the School Map







Reading

Just like in primary school, reading is one of the most important things you can do for your learning. Did you know that reading a high-quality book for just 30 minutes a day can improve your learning?

Here's how to get the most out of your daily reading:

- 1. Take time to choose a book you are going to enjoy
 - This is the most important thing! Reading a book you love will inspire you in so many ways – you might even read for longer than 30 minutes! Think about what sort of books and stories you enjoy. Are they adventure stories? Funny stories? You choose! Ask a friend, teacher or family member for a book recommendation!
- 2. Read for <u>at least 30 minutes a day every day</u>
 - The more you read, the more you'll learn!
- 3. Look up words or phrases you don't understand
 - Talk to a parent or teacher about them you can even write them down to help you remember them
- 4. Talk about what you've read (once or twice a week)
 - You can talk to a sibling, parent, friend or teacher
 - Or you can write about what you've read!







Register Read Rally






















The Library

Your dedicated librarians, Ms Farley and Ms Sandra, are always here to help you.




Your library system: AccessIt

AccessIt is where you can find all the books in the library online. Search the catalogue to find your next book, write a review, make a reservation plus lots more!


What you can do next:






- 1. Choose a chapter book at home to read with someone

- 4. Read the next two pages and roll again!


